What Rent Payment Option is **BEST** for you?

In February, we shared that CCOC is phasing out e-transfers, which were a temporary solution during the pandemic. As of **July 15, 2024**, we will no longer accept e-transfers and will stop the auto-deposit. Any bank fees incurred in order to cancel an e-transfer sent after that date will be at your charge. But don't worry, there are three great options you can use instead! Find the one that is best for you.

Pre-authorized Payment:

What is it? You sign an agreement and give CCOC a void cheque. Your rent will come out of your bank account on the first business day of the month.

Who is it good for? You know you'll have enough money in your bank account to pay your rent and you don't want to have to keep track of dates or amounts.

This is CCOC's preferred method of payment because payments are automatically processed and applied to your account.

In person with your debit card:

What is it? You come to CCOC's office and pay your rent just like you'd make a purchase with your debit card. CCOC's office is open Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm (except public holidays).

Who is it good for? You like to pay for things in person and you're available during the day. The rent will come out of your bank account right away.

New! **TenantPay:**

What is it? You talk to your Rent Collections Officer to get your TenantPay Account number. You search for TenantPay and add it as a payee in your online banking app. You pay your rent like you would make a bill payment through online banking.

Who is it good for? You bank online but want to make sure you have the money in your account when you pay your rent. The rent will come out of your account as soon as you make the payment.

We also continue to receive cheques and money orders. These payments take longer to process so it can take two weeks or more for rent to come out of your account.
